It is our intention to advertise this event within the community, other churches and our congregation, in order to provide an opportunity for many to view what should be a wonderful concert event, via a link we as a partner will be sent.

It was also decided that we would show the movie "The Passion of the Christ" on March 31st. The viewing will be in the Great Room. We will provide sandwiches, chips, & drinks for the event that will start @ 6:00pm.

TREASURER:

General Fund income as of January 31, 2021 was \$20,763.44 (envelopes & loose plate); expenses were \$20,475.54; profit of \$287.90.

EDUCATION: The Youth Group met on Valentine's Day for a pizza party. We will be having a Movie Night sometime in March. We were wondering about the possibility of having a Potato Bar fund raiser like we have done in the past sometime in March? We are still waiting on more information on when school starts to decide on the Higher Things Youth conference this summer.

We have started a new bible study with some of the women that don't have a lot of extra time to meet weekly. We will be meeting once a month.

TRUSTEE:

- Balance for the family \$10,543.00

The work is in progress.

A new laptop computer was needed for the treasurer. We had \$870.00 in memorial funds from Suse Lehmann, Rev. William Stewart, and Don Gressman available for the purchase. One was ordered from DELL for \$701.04 on Bob Klose's credit card. The church reimbursed him for this amount. When the computer was delivered it was not what was needed. Bob returned the computer and received credit on his account. He then went to Staples and purchased the laptop that was needed for the treasurer. The computer from Staples cost \$579.99. The remaining balance of \$121.05 was returned to Trinity. This leaves a balance of \$290.10 in the memorial funds. Don Gressman \$279.00 and Revm. William Stewart \$20.10.

LENTEN SERIES - 2021 "A CALL TO RETURN"

GENERAL INTRODUCTION: In the Book of Joel, the prophet paints a vivid picture of the coming judgment of God, the Day of the Lord. The imagery is bold and terrifying: hordes of locusts swarming over the land and decimating everything. Joel's prophecy has teeth even today as wars rage, natural disasters threaten and destroy, and our culture seems to be unraveling. But right in the middle of this frightening portent, we find a tender invitation from the Lord: "Return to the Lord your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and He relents over disaster" (Joel 2:13). God's invitation and promise finds its fullness in Jesus Christ, who personifies and accomplishes all that God declares. During this season of Lent, we will consider the theme "Return to the Lord" and examine how the call to return played out in practical ways for the people who walked alongside Christ as He demonstrated and carried out God's grace and mercy on our behalf, taking God's wrath upon Himself, setting the stage for God to "turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind Him" (Joel 2:14). Each sermon in this series focuses on a particular event in the Passion, with a special focus on the people involved in the event. Studying the events and people helps to connect the hearers with Series Introduction Return to the Lord © 2020 Concordia Publishing House. Scripture: ESV®. 3 their own sinful nature, to emphasize how we have turned away from the Lord, and to reinforce and rejoice in God's call for us to return to Him with all our heart.

LAUD & HONOR ON PALM SUNDAY

The Palm Sunday anthem "All Glory, Laud and Honor" is one of Christendom's oldest hymns. St Theodulf of Orleans, who helped reform the church under Charlemagne, wrote the lyrics in the year 820 while imprisoned in France.

The lyrics recount Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem,, and event the medieval church reenacted every Palm Sunday. Clergy and townspeople processed from fields through the city gates, behind a Jesus figure riding a donkey. At the gates, children began singing the hymn in Latin – *Gloria, laus et honor* – and onlookers soon chimed in.

City gates may be a thing of the past, as the website Hymnary.org notes, yet we still praise our blessed Redeemer "because we know just what kind of King He was and is – an everlasting King who reigns not just in Jerusalem but over the entire earth. What more could we do but praise Him with glory, laud and honor."

All glory, laud and honor to you, Redeemer King, To whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring. You are the King of Israel and David's royal Son, Now in the Lord's name coming, The King and Blessed One.

DISTRICT MISSION GRANTS 2020-2021

Introducing Muslims to the Savior — Lutheran Heritage Foundation - Lutheran Heritage Foundation (LHF) supports the mission of the LCMS – bringing Christ to the lost. Fifty countries in the world have a Muslim majority, and LHF is at work in 14 of them. However, because Arabic is spoken around the world, materials from LHF have the potential to reach into Islamic regions where there are few or no active Lutheran missions. These translations are also needed here in the United States. In addition to Bibles, pastors use other resources, such as Luther's Small Catechism, hymnals, devotions, etc. to teach the Gospel. Many of these books only cost \$5 to translate into languages like Arabic, Farah, Bahasa Indonesian, or Kazakh. This grant would help LHF supply pastors and missionaries with over 1,000 of these Lutheran books translated in the languages of our Christian Brothers and sisters around the world. Grant amount: \$5,000

NATIONAL MISSION GRANTS 2019-2021

Music Outreach, Classes, and Resources on the Border - Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care, El Paso, Texas – Grant \$98,400

The ministry of YLMHC impacts the lives of 400-500 students with educational programs, classroom space, and equipment. For the past 17 years YLMHC's music ministry has proven successful in reaching out to the unchurched by witnessing to the mercy and grace of Christ. The Adelante Ministries offers music classes and leadership training to youth and adults while it also provides service to the church and community. Through involvement in this music program, many students have come to faith in Christ. This grant will enable YLMHC to better equip their classroom and rehearsal space so they can serve and teach a larger range of students. It will also allow them to adapt existing space for music instruction, purchase recording equipment, create video tutorials for online instruction, fund a music intern position, and purchase musical instruments for students unable to afford their own.

PAYING IT BACK — AND FORWARD

During the pandemic, acts of kindness seemed especially meaningful. Last spring, as Covid-19 hit Native American communities particularly hard, an interesting transatlantic outreach occurred. Donations from Ireland began appearing in a relief fund for Navajo and Hopi families, leading administrators to suspect the account had been hacked. Then they realized a cross-generational payback was underway.

In 1847, Choctaw Tribe members sent \$170 overseas to Ireland to help with Potato Famine relief. That generosity was never forgotten, and by May 2020, people in Ireland had contributed more than \$4 million toward pandemic

assistance for relatives of people who'd helped their ancestors. Many donors included an Irish proverb meaning "In each other's shadows the people live."

The concept of paying it forward dates back to a 1784 letter by Benjamin Franklin. It also echoes Jesus' Golden Rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). How might you live out this practice today?


